

December 1 - Cuba and the US

The U.S. announced in December 17, 2014, that, after decades of isolation, it would begin taking major steps to normalize relations with Cuba, its neighbor to the south. The announcement marked a dramatic shift away from a policy that has its roots in one of the darkest moments of the Cold War—the Cuban missile crisis. Although the U.S. trade embargo is unlikely to end any time soon, American and Cuban leaders today are trying to bring a relationship once defined by antithetical ideologies into the 21st century.

JUNE, THE HIGHLIGHT MONTH OF THE YEAR 2016

The year started out with my usual visit to my dermatologist. I go annually to check for basal cell carcinoma. Also looked at was a cyst on my forehead, which the dermatologist said could be removed or not, my choice. I said "remove" and had surgery which went quite well. Then came the pathology report on the cyst. It turned out to be desmoplastic melanoma, a rare form of melanoma. A second surgery was required. Then the wheels turned fast, I had a C.T. scan, preop physical exam with all the usual screening. The operating room was reserved, the surgical team was assembled, and I had my surgery a few days later. I was referred to an Oncologist, Dr. David King, and he had issues about the adequacy of the margins around the cancer site. He raised the question, "should followup include more

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surgery, or chemotherapy, or radiation therapy, or a combination. Desmoplastic melanoma is rare. The doctors here knew of it, but not all had worked with it, so a referral was made to Mayo Clinic for a decision.

Mayo was a unique experience in itself. The Melanoma Team had all my records, had carefully examined them, and were ready for me when I arrived. I cannot say enough for the efficiency, coordination and respect shown to me. The first doctor I saw was the surgeon, and he ruled out further surgery from



the start. A relief. He explained chemotherapy was not considered, is it is not very effective with this type of cancer. That left radiation therapy. The medical oncologist concurred with that recommendation. I was referred to the radiation doctor, and he explained in detail what radiation therapy was and what side effects I could expect, basically redness and blistering. They then made a mask using a plastic mesh screen which was firmly pressed over my face. Two straps from the mask locked into position (This was for use at the center) and pulled the mask tight to the table. It was not uncomfortable. This was to hold my head in the exact position to the algorithm determined by the radiation doctor.

My next choice was having radiation therapy back in the Twin Cities, in Rochester, or Northfield. I opted to stay within the Mayo System, and chose the Northfield Clinic as it is closer, has easier parking, etc. It was a good choice. The staff in Northfield were wonderful; pleasant, complementing, encouraging, and very professional. They offered a very comforting environment.



I would receive 4800 cGy from a photon beam (X-ray) linear accelerator. I then was given the choice of 5 treatments at 960 cGy or 20 treatments at 240 cGy. What limited studies there are were made in Australia, and they had found a statistical advantage with the 20 course

treatment. I chose that course beginning June 6th until July 1st. The treatments went better than expected with only minor redness to the forehead and minimal blistering. At the end of the program, I got to ring the traditional Mayo Bell of June, the highlight month of the completion.



This I did 4 times for each week of treatment. Most of the staff were present, and I received a certificate for a free muffin at a local bakery, and a very pretty blue lapel pin with the words HOPE over the words "Radiation Oncology." What made everything go so well was not just the support of Mayo Clinic, but the love and support of the people of Pilgrim House. I had transportation help for 17 days of the necessary 20 days. The clinic gave a tour and explanation to each driver, and they became ever more impressed with the number of volunteers. This help was much more needed than I had expected. My THANKS! I really can't express the warmth and comfort we, I have to include Karen, received through this experience. It was a blessing.

On Sept 19th I had my last follow up appointment with Mayo in Northfield. On Nov 17th I had a CT scan and on Nov 18th my appointment with Dr King in Fridley. Everything looks clean and clear! As of now, my follow up care will remain with Dr King and Karen and I are
