December 3 – Minnesota Goes to World War I and the Aftermath

The First Minnesotan troops left Fort Snelling on December 1, 1917, just one hundred year ago. Learn how the war to end all wars got started, how we got in, how Minnesotans saw it and what were the results. GREAT DECISIONS DECEMBER 7 – THE FUTURE OF EUROPE

7:00pm at Pilgrim House

The outcome of the United Kingdom referendum on EU membership sent shockwaves across the globe. The European Union has helped secure peace in Europe for the past 70 years but now faces an uncertain future. Amid a refugee crisis, lingering financial recession and the constant specter of terrorism, unity seems more imperative than ever. What will post-Brexit Europe look like, and how can U.S. foreign policy adapt?

Our speaker will be Mary Curtin, who joined the Humphrey School of Public Affairs at the University of Minnesota as Diplomat-in-Residence in 2013 after a twenty-five-year career as a Department of State Foreign Service Officer. As Diplomat-in-Residence, she teaches courses in foreign policy and diplomacy.

During her Foreign Service Career, she served at the U.S. Mission to the EU in Brussels; as Political

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Counselor in Warsaw, Poland; and at missions in Tunisia, Mali, and Chile, as well as in Washington, D.C.

Dr. Curtin earned a Ph.D. in History from Columbia University, writing her dissertation on "Hubert H. Humphrey and the Politics of the Cold War, 1943-1954," she has a Masters in Security Studies from the Army War College, and a BA from the University of Notre Dame. She speaks French, Polish, and Spanish.

UPDATE ON UUA DISASTER RELIEF FUND

In the wake of devastating hurricanes and fires, in the last six weeks the UUA Disaster Relief Fund has funded \$80,000 in block grants to UU congregations and organizations. These grants are helping rebuild buildings, provide food, shelter and transportation for people in need, and support local on-the-ground partners in the affected areas. COMMON READ DISCUSSION GUIDES

The UUA Common Read offers two books for 2017-2018, and discussion guides for both are now available.

Centering: Navigating Race, Authenticity, and Power in Ministry, edited by Mitra Rahnema, shares stories, analysis, and insights of UU religious leaders of color. The discussion guide for Centering was written by Aisha Hauser and Gail Forsyth-Vail.

Daring Democracy: Igniting Power, Meaning, and Connection for the America We Want, by Frances Moore Lappé and Adam Eichen, examines the reality of our democracy today and sounds a call for civic action. The discussion guide was created by Susan Lawrence.

The page also provides a video from an event at the UUA Boston headquarters where Lappé and Eichen discussed how they came to write Daring Democracy and their hopes for a new movement.
