
September 15 – Northern European Immigrants and Unitarian Universalist Humanism

The speaker is Victor Urbanowicz. Victor Urbanowicz has been a member of White Bear UU Church since 1980. Approximately, 1992 he joined a Twin Cities group interested in UU history which became the MidAmerica Region History and Heritage Committee. He is the chair and David Conradi-Jones is a member. The group compiled the histories of local UU congregations and published them in 2013 as a paperback, titled *Twin Cities UU Congregations* which is available on amazon.com. He occasionally writes vignettes, or historical sketches, on Midwestern Unitarian Universalist history which appear on the

MidAmerica Region website. This morning's talk is one such vignette titled "Northern European Immigrants and Unitarian Humanism" was first presented at the UU Church of Willmar, Minnesota.

September 22 – Mrs. Ambassador

The first Woman Ambassador ever in United States History was Eugenie Anderson of Minnesota. She was also one of the founders of the DFL in Minnesota. Her story is told by her grand daughter, Mary Anderson DuPont, author of the new book on her life.





September 29 - Birds of Minnesota and the Effects of Climate Change - Monica Bryand

Photographer Monica Bryand presents a gorgeous slide show of birds she has photographed within our state for the Audubon Society of Minnesota. This multi-year effort is part of the tracking of the effects of climate change on bird populations in the United States. Monica will discuss where she photographed various species, and talk about the stresses that put them in danger for decline.

recycling or garbage pickup at Pilgrim House.)



The annual gathering of the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) was held in Spokane, Washington in June. In attendance were Mel and Kathy Aanerud; and, this year, Pilgrim House had an on-line participant, Nancy Olson.

Nancy and Kathy were the voting delegates from Pilgrim House. There were workshops, keynote speakers, and a Sunday morning service that included the Spokane community. Business acted on included:



 Adoption of a Statement of Conscience, "Our Democracy Uncorrupted," which affirms the importance of democracy as an ideal and identifies historic and current restricting dynamics. (See related article below.)

Adoption of three Actions of Immediate Witness

 endorsing the Green New Deal, supporting the right to boycott in support of Palestinian rights, and condemning US treatment of immigrants and asylum seekers.

The General Assembly attendees will do a noontime summary presentation this fall at Pilgrim House, following a Sunday program.

OUR DEMOCRACY UNCORRUPTED -

UUA's Statement of Conscience

At this summer's General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) delegates adopted a Statement of Conscience, "Our Democracy Uncorrupted," which affirms the importance of democracy as an ideal and identifies historic and current dynamics that restrict its practitioners and beneficiaries.


Democracy, the UUA officially declares, is "an end in itself, an ethical ideal, a moral and spiritual way of relating to one another. Sadly, many of our democratic institutions have been corrupted into being merely a means for giving powerful interests the appearance of legitimacy."

The Statement of Conscience, which grew out of the Congregational Study/Action Issue delegates selected in 2016:


- discusses the importance of democracy at the congregational, denominational, and civic level
- calls for continued expansion of voting rights and participation in democratic processes at all levels of political life
- calls UUs to attend to democratic practices in congregational and denominational life because "realizing true democracy requires expanding to include more diverse voices."

At Pilgrim House, activities related to this Statement of Conscience will include a Sunday program on Elections in Minnesota with Secretary of State Steve Simon, programs on the 19th Amendment referenced under Women's Suffrage Day below, ongoing discussions led by David Conradi-Jones's political coterie on political questions of the day and urging of individual action, and other activities still to be developed.
