
Upcoming Sunday Programs (10:15 to 11:30 am)




September 14 - Minnesota book award winner - Kao Kalia Yang

September 21 – Talking Trash- reducing the amount of trash that we generate

Assistant Director for Hennepin County Environment and Energy Department, Dave McNary has worked 30 plus years for Hennepin County's Environment and Energy Department. Prior to joining Hennepin County, Dave was the Solid Waste Manager for Pierce County, Wisconsin. Additionally, he served as the Recycling Coordinator for the City of Inver Grove Heights. In his current capacity, Dave manages the county's waste reduction and recycling programs, household hazardous waste programs, solid waste operations and oversees the county's district energy facility. Hennepin County's Solid Waste Division has 56 employees and an annual operating budget of ninety million dollars. Dave will be speaking about the



county's efforts to reinvent the county's solid waste system and reduce the 1.3 million tons of solid waste materials that are generated annually in Hennepin County.



September 28 – Portraits of our Neighbors: Urban wildlife photography

Karen Kraco is a retired science teacher and writer whose work with the Northeaster newspaper put a "real" camera in her hands for the first time in 2016. Her lifetime of paying attention suddenly had an artistic outlet; she learned how powerful the visual can be in evoking emotions and making connections. In recent years, Karen has focused on urban

wildlife photography, which she sees as a form of street photography: candids of creatures living their lives, much as we live ours, in spaces that are just as much theirs as ours. She especially enjoys winter "crowtography," tracking the thousands of crows in Minneapolis as they converge every night in a huge roost.

October 5 - Martin Sabo - A Book from Lori Sturdevant

Author and journalist Lori Sturdevant is back with her newest book: *Martin Sabo, The making of the modern legislature*. While best known as a Congressman from Minnesota's Fifth Congressional District, he also made significant contributions to American Political Life earlier in his career as Speaker of the House of the Minnesota House of Representatives. He helped transform the legislature of the 1960's to 1970's to operating more in the public view and taking responsibility for the education and well-being of the Minnesota citizens.


NEW ARRIVAL AT PILGRIM HOUSE!

PH SUNDAY STORIES

Once a month, October through May, we are asking for volunteers to share their Sunday Stories (see details below).

You can do so by zoom or in person and these sessions are not recorded. You can share your story for the first time, or if you have already shared and want to share an updated version, that would work well too. We look forward to hearing about your live and experiences.

Here is how it works:

Once a month (usually on the second Sunday of the month), we gather after the Sunday program to hear a member/friend tell their story.

Speakers will be able to share in a relaxed setting. Timewise, it can be up to about half an hour to forty five minutes (with questions) starting at 12 noon.

Here are suggested topics and questions others have used as a guideline for preparing a Sunday Story:

- Your background. Where and when did you grow up? What was your family background/history? What influenced you as you grew up?
- 2. Your journey. What are some of the path(s) your life has taken? Who or what events influenced or impacted you? What principles or values were meaningful or not a good fit?

- What drew you to Unitarianism and/or Pilgrim House?
- 3. Here and beyond. What is important in your life now? What has meaning for you as you look forward?

CHANGES AT MIDAMERICA

Long time UUA Congregational Life Consultant serving PH, Phil Lund, recently retired. In his place is MidAmerica team lead David Pyle. Several PH members who have been involved in Phil Lund's prior twice a month small congregation Zoom sharing meetups will be familiar with QuianaDenae through her participation in those recent Zoom meetings.

REPORTING FROM GENERAL ASSEMBLY

General Assembly, or often referred to as "GA," is the annual national gathering of Unitarian Universalist congregations — with workshops, business meetings, fellowship, music and future planning. The event was held at the Baltimore, Maryland convention center with an option for virtual attendance. Kathy and Mel Aanerud attended in-person in Baltimore, and Marcie Jefferys attended virtually. The voting delegates from Pilgrim House were Marcie and Kathy.

The theme, "Meet the Moment" set forth challenges for UUs to take values-based action in response to today's political, cultural, and religious realities. Following presentations, GA attendees met in cohort groups to discuss questions such as: "What are the most urgent and important needs and opportunities of this moment?" and "How do our UU values call us to respond to this moment?"

Delegates elected co-moderators for the upcoming six years, they being Re Kimberly Quinn Johnson and Bill Young. Moderators serve as the Chief Governance Officer of the UUA. More info about their role here: www.uua.org/uuagovernance/officers and their bios here:

Congregational Study/Action Issue (CSAI) invites UU congregations to engage in a multi-year period of study, reflection, and action around a topic voted on at GA. The topic with the most votes this year was "Abolition, Transformation, Faith Formation". The study list includes such issues as replacing retribution justice with transformational justice, how do we disrupt and reverse the dehumanization of incarcerated people, and many topics related to changing systems, hearts,

Actions of Immediate Witness (AIW) Delegates also voted to affirm all three AIWs that were submitted for consideration. The AIWs are statements about a significant action, event, or development in the world that necessitates immediate engagement and action among UU congregations and affiliated groups.

- "Faithful Defiance of Authoritarianism, a Call to Action: Reaffirming Our Covenants for Democracy and Freedom"
- "Funding Global LGBTIQ Freedom Amid Crisis: A Call for Immediate Action and Solidarity"
- "We Declare and Reaffirm: All People Have Inherent Worth and Inalienable Rights."

Other activities included a hymn sing from the new Virtual Hymnal that will provide new ways for congregations to engage with music; many workshop topics, and the Sunday morning worship service providing a sense of belonging, which was live streamed here at Pilgrim House.

Next year's General Assembly, in mid-June 2026, will be an all-virtual meeting with optional in-person gatherings hosted by UUA host sites that could include community connections, development opportunities and live streamed programming such as the Ware lecture and Sunday worship. Then in 2027, it's on to San Jose, California for in-person General Assembly, with virtual option.
